Every Memory Matters: Between The Censuses

Cold Spring Township, Lebanon County can easily be considered a genealogist's nightmare. Part of Stony Valley, and the southernmost tip of the Lower Anthracite Coal Region in Pennsylvania, Cold Spring Township became the perfect place for the first wave of immigrants to the Anthracite Coal Fields to settle. The Irish Potato Famine and then economic troubles in Wales and England sent hundreds of immigrants to Stony Valley, creating a population boom of 2,000 individuals by 1855. The year 1855; however, is a year that genealogists and family historians can certainly grumble over, for it's between the 1850 and 1860 census. To make matters worse, the majority of those 2,000 individuals were immigrants from Europe who arrived after the 1850 census in America, and left before the 1860 census, thus many are left with a dilemma: How can we track down our Stony Valley relations?

Over the years, I have had numerous queries from people who stumbled across the name Rausch Gap, or other towns in Stony Valley, in their Family Bibles, church records, death certificates,

or family lore, which becomes the primary way to track down Stony Valley residents. I am currently compiling a master index of the residents of Stony Valley's own Anthracite Region, primarily focusing on those who left the valley before 1870.

How can you help? If you know of individuals, or have relations, who lived in Stony Valley or worked for the Dauphin & Susquehanna/Schuylkill & Susquehanna Railroad (anywhere along the line), we'd love to get some information from you. Please send the following information you have on the individuals, along with any additional information, or photographs to Brandy M. Watts Martin.

- Name of individual
- Relationship to you (if any)
- Parents/Siblings/Spouse/Children
- Birth/Death dates and places
- ANY known occupations
- Reason why you believe they lived in, worked for, or are associated with Stony Valley and the S&S Railroad


